WELCOME



Welcome to the challenges, excitement, rewards and drama of disciple-making and multiplication—and of gathering new disciples into multiplying communities of faith, also known as churches. This will put you on the cutting edge of mission. It is a spiritual journey that demands teamwork, faith and prayer.

This conversation guide is designed to equip you and your team to make new disciples who can, in turn, make more new disciples. Making new disciples is the foundation for planting new churches that multiply. This is what the early disciples and apostles did. Paul multiplied disciples in new cities and districts, then planted multiplying churches. His two years and three months in Ephesus resulted in churches multiplying across what is Turkey today—and "all the Jews and Greeks who lived in the province of Asia heard the Word of the Lord" (Acts 19:10).

This is the first of three conversation guides:

Guide 1-Multiplying Disciples

Read *Following Jesus* (Signs Publishing, 2017) with this guide, along with the Gospels and a harmony of Jesus' story such as The Desire of Ages.

Guide 2—Planting Churches

With this guide, read *Following the Spirit* (Signs Publishing, 2018), along with the New Testament book of Acts.

Guide 3—Cultivating Movements

To be read with Following the Apostles' Vision (Signs Publishing, 2019), along with the New Testament epistles.

Each Guide is set out for 10 to 12 sessions of 1 to 1.5 hours each, with accompanying videos for use by facilitators for equipping, discussion and application with any number of groups or teams.

Videos available

You can work through this conversation guide with a group of friends at your own pace, or you can be guided by the **free videos** from **<www.following-Jesus.com**>. There is video for each of the 12 sessions of this guide. Once you have them downloaded, start Session 1—with your Bible and conversation guide open. The video will lead you through the guide, giving opportunities to pause for discussion of key ideas. For each session, there will be two, three of four video segments—each giving adequate time for discussion of key concepts. Where these fit in the conversation will be marked, as above.

You will find this equipping to be practical and inspiring. You will be exploring Jesus' method of multiplying disciples—His life stories, teaching and commission to participate with Him on this journey.

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MULTIPLYING DISCIPLES CONVERSATION GUIDE

INTRODUCTION

Jesus marked the beginning of His ministry by making disciples. Then, before He ascended, He commanded: "Go and make disciples of all nations" (Matthew 28:19). **This is our commission.** It defines **our task and our message.** On the evening of His resurrection, He said: "As the Father has sent me, I am sending you" (John 20:21).

Jesus' vision was for all His disciples to be disciple-makers of disciple-makers until the good news of His death and resurrection had reached Judea, Samaria and the ends of the earth. It was to reach every *relational stream* (see Matthew 28:20).

Who is a disciple?

A short definition is:

A disciple is one who makes disciples.

A longer definition is:

• A disciple is a person who is becoming more like Jesus Christ every day, in every way, including as a disciple-maker (see Ephesians 4:15).

Becoming a disciple can take a short time, but discipleship is the journey of a lifetime.

As we make new disciples, we plant new churches for a new church is a gathering of new disciples.

The Gospels outline Jesus' method and model of disciple-making, and the book of Acts is our guidebook for planting new churches. A basic insight from Paul's missionary journeys of church planting is: each local church that is planted is responsible to multiply disciples and communities of faith. In movements, all believers are disciple-makers—and all disciple-makers are involved in planting new churches.

This is how all church movements begin—as disciple-making and church-planting movements—and this is how movements today will complete God's work. God has called us to plant new and multiplying communities of faith in unentered places. **This is the work that God has placed on all disciples—all believers, all pastors and all leaders.**

Disciple-making Teams

Because Jesus always worked with teams, equipping His disciples to do the same, we equip in teams. We form teams of three to four to discuss this guide. We can work through this guide over a few days or do one session at a time scheduled over some weeks.

During this equipping time:

- a. Learn to pray together conversationally.
- b. Read and re-read your textbooks: the Gospels and the book of Acts.
- c. Work through this conversation guide and **put into practice** what you learn.
- d. **Look for a person-of-peace**: check out what Jesus said in Luke 10:8, 9—and do it.
- e. Share your journey with other believers, **encourage them to make disciples and form more church-planting teams.** Watch for the activity of the Holy Spirit in the lives of others, fan that spark of interest and multiply your work.



SESSION 2

JESUS

-MOVEMENT-BUILDER AND DISCIPLE-MAKER

Following Jesus in His movement-building and disciple-making inspires and informs us. He used five invitations in making disciples, and the same five in cultivating His kingdom movement over the five phases of His life and ministry.

Jesus' Ministry Phases

PHASES OF MOVEMENT-BUILDING

After 30 years of **preparation**, Jesus' public ministry began with His baptism and anointing by the Holy Spirit. Then, during the 18 months of His early Judean ministry, He laid the **foundations** of His movement. Following the imprisonment of John the Baptist, Jesus moved to Capernaum where His disciples **participated** with Him in ministry. He continued **leadership multiplication** following His appointment of the 12 apostles and sending out the 72 in teams to places that He was planning to visit. He promised the Holy Spirit, who came upon them on the Day of Pentecost, to build this new **movement**.



SESSION 3

HARVEST MODEL

-PARABLES AND EQUIPPING

In this session, we focus on undersanding Jesus' use of the farming or gardening cycle to illustrate our involvement in His kingdom mission. We then begin to overlay His equipping of disciple-makers, found in Luke 10:1–24, over the five activities of a farmer. As well, we will reflect briefly on insights to be gained from the life-cycle metaphor for multiplying disciples and planting churches.

Jesus' Farming Parables Mark 4:26–29, compare 4:3–20

Jesus shared *harvest* parables to reveal "the secret of the kingdom of God" (Mark 4:11, 26). We use the parable of *four types of soils*—with the "good soil" (prepared, cultivated and full of manure) producing a "multiplying" crop (Mark 4:3-20); as well as the *harvest model* (Mark 4:26-29)—sometimes referred to as the four fields. 1 It is one field, but the field changes.

Discuss this agricultural and disciple-making model.²



Farmers in the Middle East harvest to sow new fields the next season. They keep the best seeds to plant again—to multiply. They "sow in tears"—"weeping" for their families are hungry—but they cannot eat the seed; they must plant or next season they will starve (see Psalm 126:5, 6). This is a foundational idea. How would you understand this for friends you are leading to be disciples?

INSIGHTS FROM AN ALTERNATIVE MODEL

Church is also spoken of as "a body" (see 1 Corinthians 12:27). In these guides, we use the harvest or farming metaphor, but the life-cycle metaphor alerts us to important issues. There are also five phases:

- 1. Conception: A team starts to plan.
- 2. Pre-natal: All necessary elements or ministries—including multiplying disciple-making—are initiated.
- 3. Birth and growth: The new church goes public with gatherings, engaging with the community.
- 4. Reproduction and multiplication: New groups and multiplying churches are planted.
- 5. Maturity, including old age and decline: Zeal and ministries can plateau—and the sense of movement fades.



What insights do we gain from the Harvest Model?	

Jesus Equipping the Seventy-two Luke 10:1–24



After a short time, Jesus had many disciples (see John 3:22; 4:1, 2). When He called the twelve to be *apostles*, He had a "crowd of disciples" (Luke 6:12–19). Luke 10 tells of Him calling and training many more. This was five or six months before His crucifixion. We will look carefully at how He trained these disciples to make new disciples.

SESSION 4

MAKING DISCIPLES

PREPARING TEAMS AND PLACES

With this session, we begin the first major section of this Conversation Guide—Making Discipes. Both this and the next session will focus on the first activity of a farmer, Prepare—with two aspects of this preparation covered in this session (Teams and Places), and two in the next (Prayer and Connecting).

SESSION 5

MAKING DISCIPLES

PREPARING BY PRAYER AND CONNECTING

The prayer Jesus taught us to pray in multiplying disciples is unique. It is possibly a prayer you have seldom prayed. Also, those Jesus said to look for and spend time with are identified by special qualities. These key ideas are very important for movements.

Prayer: Luke 10:1-4, 16-24 (see also John 14:12-23)

Some ways of praying

a. 10.02 & 4.03 prayers

Jesus told the 72 to pray for more harvesters (Luke 10:2) and Paul asked the churches in Colossae to pray for opportunities—or divine appointments—to share the gospel (Colossians 4:3, 4). Some set a daily alarm and pray these prayers at 10.02 am and 4.03 pm.

b. Conversational prayer

A natural and relaxed conversation with other people where God is included in the conversation. It can happen in cafés, at home or work, indoors and outside. Just as a conversation does not go around a circle, and some talk and other listen more, so it is with conversational prayer. The prayer stays on one topic before moving onto a different topic. There may be times of silence.

c. Scripture prayer

Read the Psalms as your prayer to God or pray a prayer in Scripture e.g. Daniel 9:4-19, Philippians 1:3-11.

d. Praying through scripture

Take a passage of scripture and base your prayer on the ideas within the passage.

e. Listening prayer

Ask God who you should visit, what you should say, and then in silence listen to the Spirit speaking into your mind.

f. Prayer walking

Walk around an area praying that the Holy Spirit will work in the lives of the people who live there and that God will open a connection with them, or pray at a place where an event will be held.

g. Prayer teams

Meet together to pray either in person or electronically.

h. 777 prayer

Pray at 7 am and 7 pm, 7 days a week.

SESSION 6

SOWING GOSPEL SEED

Many believers struggle to know how to move from contact to sharing faith, without preaching at people and scaring them away from faith! However, in the second activity of the harvest cycle—sowing—Jesus outlined three simple reproducible steps that anyone can use. This is evangelism on the path of life.

[2] Sow

Sowing is done best in authentic relationships. We should follow the **incarnational** model of Jesus (the Word became flesh and dwelt among us—John 1:14).

1. Eat their food¹—listen to their story

While you eat, what do you need to do?

Here are some prompt questions:

- Tell me about your family.
- How are things going at work/school/university?
- What has been happening in your life recently?

Use reflective listening.²

2. Heal them—share your story

Life is four dimensional—mental, physical, spiritual and social (Luke 2:52). How can you heal or meet people's needs?

Encouragement: suggest a N.E.W.S.T.A.R.T.³

Prayer for God's healing.

- 1 This could be at their home or at a café.
- 2 Reflective listening is hearing and understanding, then letting the other know they are being heard and understood.
- 3 N.E.W.S.T.A.R.T. is Nutrition, Exercise, Water, Sunshine, Temperance, Air, Rest and Trust in God. These health principles will address many of the mental, physical, spiritual, and social issues that people experience.

Sharing your story is like a **bridge** to God's story. You know what it is to be healed—God has healed you. Jesus told the delivered demoniac: "Return home and tell how much God has done for you. So the man went away and told all over town how much Jesus had done for him" (Luke 8:36).

The bridge to sharing is the steps Jesus gave:
1. Who do you regularly eat with?

2. Who do you need to listen to more?
3. In what area of life do they need support or healing? How can you encourage them?
4. See if you can introduce your story to encourage them—and to introduce God's story, showing that He also cares about them and loves them. How do you think you might introduce God's story from your story?



SESSION 7

GOSPEL PRESENTATIONS

-TELLING GOD'S STORY

The third step in sowing gospel seed—after (1) eating with and listening to people, and (2) meeting or healing their needs and sharing in two or three sentences how you have learnt God cares for you—is telling people God's story. In this session, we identify God's good news story and how to introduce it.

Which scripture could you use to explain the gospel? Read each of the following scriptures and outline what you find God's good news is and how you could share this with others in language they would understand:

Mark 16:9–20: Jesus defined the gospel.
1 Corinthians 15:1–11: Paul succinctly explained the gospel.
Romans 3:21 – 26: Paul shared how to be right with God.

SESSION 8

DISCOVERY BIBLE READING

Having connected and introduced Jesus, we encourage our contacts or friends to form a group to read one of the Gospels. This can be with friends at work during a lunch-break, with your family, or with a group in your community. We call this a *Discovery Bible Reading* group. Many know almost nothing about Jesus—or have very distorted views of who He is—and many Christians (and maybe you!) have not read any of the Gospels from beginning to end.

- If a Christian, we will discover much about Jesus by reading a Gospel through.
- If your friends have no knowledge of Jesus, they will be surprised by what Jesus was really like.

In this session, we will describe and practice *Discovery Bible Reading*, and discuss some principles for healthy multiplying small groups.

OUTLINE

- Friends meet to read stories of Jesus. The gospel of Mark is a good place to start.
- One person prays a prayer like this: "Dear God, please guide us. Thank You."
- Start at the beginning, reading one story at a time.
- Read each story through twice, then retell the story in your own words.

DISCUSS THE STORY USING FIVE QUESTIONS

- 1. What is new?
- 2. What surprises you?
- 3. What don't you understand?
- 4. What will you obey or apply?
- 5. What will you share with someone this week? Plan when to meet again—to read the next story.

Pray for each other, something like this: "Dear God, Thank You for Your Word. Help us to follow You. Amen."



IDEAS AND SUGGESTIONS

- If you don't understand something, don't argue—you will read more!
- · Invite other people to join you.
- Give each person a bookmark.¹
- Encourage others to form groups.

WHEN YOU MEET TO READ AGAIN

You could ask:

- 1. Who have you met or caught up with?
- 2. What two things did you learn? Review.
- 3. How did we go applying the insights from last time?
- 4. How did we go sharing?

Then continue to the next story.

Small Group Principles

Foster the best small group principles in your Discovery Bible Reading groups.

- Respect each person's experience.
- Do not read or pray around the circle.
- · Always include un-churched and/or lost people.
- Keep to an agreed time-frame (usually about 1 hour).
- Have a clear path of Bible reading and discovery.
- Multiply through new *relational streams* by the time the group grows to 12 people.
- Have a process of coaching and support for the leaders and apprentices who foster small groups.

Follow a simple, reproducible plan (with suggested times):

- Connecting (5 min)
 - Who did we meet for the first time this week?
 - · What did we learn about them?
- Sharing and accountability (10 min)
 - How did we go applying what we learned last time?
 - Who did we share with since we last met?
- Discovery Bible Reading (30 min)
- Prayer
 - Read the next section of the Bible book.
 - Discuss using the five bookmark questions.
- Application and discussion (15 min)
 - · Accountability: all discuss Questions 4 & 5 of the bookmark questions.
 - Plan a service project together, to meet community needs.
 - Prayer

SESSION 9

CULTIVATING GROWTH

Jesus described gospel seed growing "all by itself." We have found that this happens through the simple process of *Discovery Bible Reading*. In this session, we will see how the flow of the three messages of Revelation 14:6–13 provide the ideal environment for growth—and answering difficult questions.

[3] Cultivate

so the crop grows "by itself"

Discovery Bible Reading provides a great method for sowing gospel seed—for use in small groups, with friends and contacts. How do we cultivate the growing interest? Here are a range of ideas for cultivating the interest that God is growing.

Use Discovery Bible Reading with uneducated people.

Use Discovery Bible Reading in Bible classes.

Use Discovery Bible Reading in church—for the sermon.

1. Learning from the order or flow of Revelation 14:6–13

Stage 1: Context (Revelation 12-14)—what is the group's background?
Stage 2: Eternal gospel (Revelation 14:6)—what themes lead to Jesus?
Stage 3: Practical Christian living—"fear God" (Revelation 14:7). What does it mean to "fear God"? (Job 28:28; Proverbs 8:13)

Stage 4: Distinctive doctrines (Revelation 14:7) — which would you include?	
Stage 5: Heavy prophecy (Revelation 14:8-12) — such as dragon, beast, false prophet.	
Stage 6: Mission (Revelation 14:13) — equipping needs to take place at each stage.	
THIS SEQUENCE provides a flow for sharing faith and answering questions:	
 When a new person in your group ask, "What happens when a friend dies?" it is a Stage being asked by a Stage 1 person. How could you answer this question in a Stage 1 way? 	
 When someone at Stage 2 (who has accepted Jesus) asks about the antichrist—a Stage how could you respond using a Stage 2 or 3 answer? 	5 question—
Questions from a next stage might suggest it is time to move to that stage of sharing.

2. Answering questions

- a. If a person or the group does not understand something: Keep reading.
- b. **If a person asks a question on a difficult subject**—for example, death, Second Coming, resurrection or Sabbath—suggest: "Sometime, shall we read a story about Jesus and that subject?"

VALUE ADDING TO Discovery bible reading

The life story of Jesus, as well as most Bible books and biblical teachings, can be explored using *Discovery Bible Reading*. However, there is an important role for Bible teachers sharing in workshops, seminars and sermons. In this session, we explore how to introduce these and add value to the journey of Bible reading in groups.
